

Low-tech, metaphorical codesign toolkits, such as Lego Serious Play animals, color labels, and the South-up world map


Design research question


Through autoethnographic co/design, how can we, as the diverse student body, map our migrations against the geopolitical canvas?





Through low-tech materials, the diverse student body locate the USA's representations of global countries (newspapers and sticky notes) against the geopolitical canvas (the South-up map).





The authors' data analysis, where the diverse student body's immigration (color labels) are contextualized by the geopolitical canvas (the annotated South-up map).

Design research findings

Through autoethnographic co/design, institutional diversity is critiqued for its superficial inclusivity, stereotypical misrepresentation, and perpetuated oppression in the USA neoliberal multiculturalism.
